Through surgeries and recovery, highs and lows, from high school to college to the real world, Skylar welcomed others on his journey. *Before I Had the Words* is the story of what came before the videos and what happened behind the scenes. This revealing autobiography is great addition to LGBT literature.

It's a personal, accessible and compelling look at gender violence, rape culture, personal responsibility and the effect that patriarchal cultures have on both men women. Thoris Elva and Tom Stranger's TED talk about their story has been viewed over a million times and resulted in coverage from *Cosmopolitan* magazine and interest from *The Washington Post*, *Yahoo News*, *CBS This Morning with Charlie Rose*, and more. This book is unique in that it humanizes both sides of a terrible act. For such dark subject matter, the book is uplifting (even funny) and presents the argument that no one is beyond forgiveness.

He is also a professor and television host. He teaches criminology at the University of Western Ontario. He is the lead investigator on the true-crime series *To Catch a Killer*, on the Oprah Winfrey Network in Canada.

It has been almost ten years since Matthias graduated from the elite Blackburne School, where his roommate, Fritz, vanished just after an argument over Matthias's breaking of the school's honor code, and Matthias has long been haunted by idea that his betrayal led to his friend's disappearance. Years later, Matthias is stuck, a failure as a writer, a boyfriend, a person. When he is offered the opportunity to return to Blackburne as an English teacher, he sees it as a chance to put his life back together. But once on campus, Matthias gets swiftly drawn into the past, and is driven to find out what happened to Fritz. The novel explores themes of friendship and betrayal, love and loss, privilege and outsider status, and the volatility of youth. It's a literary thriller, but also a moving coming-of-age story. Stories set in boarding schools have always been popular.

In September 1873, Elizabeth Coughlin, a widow bankrupted by her husband's folly and death, embarks on a buffalo hunt with her estranged and mysterious brother-in-law Michael. With no money, no family, no job or security, she hopes to salvage something of her former life and the lives of the hired men and women who depend on her. The buffalo hunt that her husband had planned, she now realizes, was his last hope for saving the land. Elizabeth and Michael plunge south across the aptly named Deadline demarcating Indian Territory from their home state of Kansas. Nothing could have prepared them for the dangers. This book is for fans of Cormac McCarthy, Phillip Meyer and Michael Punke.

One Christmas morning, while young Amish twins Henry and Harvey are sledding, they find a big black dog wandering in a field. They adopt the Newfoundland and name him Lucky, and he soon becomes their best friend and playmate. When tragedy strikes and Harvey drowns in a spring creek, Henry's only source of comfort is his furry companion. To make matters worse, the Depression is especially hard on Henry's parents who have more children than they can care for. He is sent to live with another family, where he becomes enchanted with a girl named Katie. Eventually, Lucky passes away, leaving a hole in Henry's heart, and he wonders if he will ever find another friend as faithful and loving. But no holiday story is complete without a miracle...

Beginning with the Palm Sunday battle of Towton, the bloodiest ever fought on English soil, *Wonders Will Never Cease* relates the fabulous adventures of one man and his noble family amid the chaos and political intrigue that beset England during the War of the Roses, when two great houses battled for control of the throne. This title has already been published in the UK to rave reviews and it now includes a 'blurb' by Neil Gaiman. It's an exhilarating, magical blend of history and fantasy.

Medieval magic, murder, and mayhem! It is 1164, and for a hundred years England has been ruled by the Normans. A young Saxon boy named Durwin, crippled by a childhood accident, caught the eye of a Norman sage teaching at a rural school of magic. Realizing that the boy had promise, Durwin was made stable boy, and eventually allowed to attend classes. Now twenty, Durwin is proficient enough that he is assigned to teach, but the other sages refuse to promote him and he is hassled by the Norman juniors for his disability. But those troubles turn out to be the least of his worries when he manages to correct errors in an ancient corrupted spell, which promptly prophesies murder. This is the first book in a new Anglo-Saxon historical fantasy series. Last Flag Flying, set thirty-four years after the events of *The Last Detail*, brings together the same beloved characters Billy Bad-Ass Buddusky, Mule Mulhall, and Meadows to reprise the same journey but under very different circumstances. Now middle-aged, Meadows seeks out his former captors in their civilian lives to help him bury his son, a Marine killed in Iraq, in Arlington National Cemetery. When he learns that the authorities have told him a lie about the circumstances of his son's death, he decides, with the help of the two others, to transport him home to Portsmouth. And so begins the journey, centered around a solemn mission but, as in the first book, a protest against injustice and celebration of life too, at once irreverent, funny, profane, and deeply moving. The movie of the same name is currently in production and will star Steve Carrell, Bryan Cranston, and Laurence Fishburne.
